in that direction and says in effect, the Legislature just won't do it, and Senator Hoff has said the same thing. You waste a lot of time, and you get nowhere in trying to carry out that theory, which is good, but if you let the Executive Department take the problem right initially and go right ahead and get it done and get it done promptly.

DR. TEMPLETON: I would agree with him in part, but I think you are disregarding a recommendation made by Mr. Case, in which he suggested a reformulation of this problem, so that we put the time period first and then go through those three levels.

MR. BOND: In essence, aren't we saying, Well, perhaps we might have new reapportioned Legislature which might be responsible? We really don't trust their divorce of the people so we aren't going to let them apportion. I am opposed.

THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. Burdette?

DR. BURDETTE: I would speak in favor of the
Legislature doing it, not alone on the ground of separation of powers, but I make the point that here I agree with
