governor.

JUDGE ADKINS: I have one question as to detail. If Mr. Case's plan were adopted, would it be envisaged that amendments by the Legislature to the plan would be subject to gubernatorial veto, or would their amendments be kind of sui juris so there would be no veto? The reason I raise the question is, it seems to me if their amendments are subject to veto, then the submission to the Legislature could in many instances become a complete nullity because all he would have to do would be to veto their amendments and at the same time promulgate his own plan.

THE CHAIRMAN: Except they could pass it over his veto. I assume Mr. Case that your plan meant passage by law, which would, of course, be subject to veto.

MR. CASE: That is right.

JUDGE ADKINS: It would be subject to veto.

MR. CASE: All the legislative process.

DR. WINSLOW: But not item veto.

JUDGE ADKINS: In other words, he would have to

veto the whole plan.
