

1           MR. MILLER: I favor the principles involved,  
2 but it would seem to me that maybe if we adopt the con-  
3 cept that many of us are advocating of a continuing  
4 Legislature, it should merely provide that the governor  
5 would immediately lay the matter before the Legislature  
6 and have a time limit in which they could act. In other  
7 words, I don't envisage that we should require a special  
8 session of the Legislature just to consider this one  
9 thing.

10           THE CHAIRMAN: Not if the Legislature is in  
11 session. I take it that is implicit in what Mr. Case has  
12 suggested.

13           MR. CASE: Yes.

14           MR. CLAGETT: Mr. Chairman, the court of law  
15 and then go to the Court of Appeals, then what happens?  
16 It becomes law? Then what happens? I understood it would  
17 then be the function of the Court of Appeals to go ahead  
18 and promulgate a plan.

19           THE CHAIRMAN: It would be up to the Court of  
20 Appeals to decide whether it would do that or do something  
21 else, but the matter would be left entirely to the courts.
