THE CHAIRMAN: I will try. I am not so sure I can, but to the extent I understand the term, continuing body, I don't think it is necessarily affected by the vote, because the way the section was set up initially, you provided that the General Assembly was a continuing body, but its term was fixed by law. All we have done now is to say that its term, the term of its sessions, shall be fixed by the Constitution. The concept, as I understood it from the Chairman, and he can correct me if I am wrong, is that the continuance of the elected Legislature as a continuing body, independent of its sittings, its sessions, merely means that it is the same body. It is not a new body every time it has a new session.
