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will quietly subside and what's best for the whole goes through.

I don't think that a conference committee ought to be a whipping boy. I think it is a very valuable part of the legislative system and I think it is very valuable to have the two chambers for that reason.

DR. BURDETTE: Could I make a comment on that? This is another thing to investigate. The Congressional rules as I understand them provide that the two chambers must make their decision between the extremes of the positions of the two Houses. In the Nebraska Legislature there was no such rule so that the bill might have no relationship whatever to the legislation that had been considered in the chambers. I do not know about Maryland.

MR. MILLER: As a practical matter, anything the conference committee agrees on that is not subject to a point of order when it comes back on the floor, many times a provision that has never been considered on the floor goes though almost unanimously.
