MR. CASE: I would say without getting into a lengthy debate on that because it can be debated, you can find cases in the Court of Appeals calling, for example, Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission a political subdivision, that the matter be rereferred to the Committee with the idea of selecting the appropriate term to designate what we are talking about, namely, resort towns and this kind of thing. I would so move if it is in order.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLAGETT: I would make this comment.

The Committee on Political Subdivisions and local government is going to recommend that the broad grant of powers be given to the counties. It is contemplated that the counties would within/: broad grant determine the election qualifications.

By putting this in the Constitution as it stands now, you are really to some extent restricting the Legislature from coming into the picture and regulating uniformly for all counties throughout the state where it may be desirable to do so in order to
