this knowledge in and of itself is going to take care of the point Dale is making.

I would have no objection myself to see it go back to specific emergency legislation because I think that's what I had in mind. But on second thought, I think it is a very tenuous position and one which, as a practical matter, wouldn't have any effect.

MR. SCANLAN: I was one of those misled by Mr. Case's motion. I recall the legislative history of this provision. I moved that the whole section on referendum be struck on the grounds we didn't need them any more. That was defeated by a fairly close vote. Mr. Case then suggested a compromise which is the language you now have in Section 8.

If it was intended to refer to emergency legislation, then it is no more than we have in the Constitution now because emergency legislation in that case the law becomes effective. I voted for the compromise because I thought this was some curb on the abuse of the referendum procedure. I would prefer it stay as it is.
