whether or not we want the referendum and if we want it let it be a democratic device and not the way it has been written in accordance with the wishes of the Commission at Easton.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Hoff.

MR. HOFF: I agree, Mr. Gentry, I think this bracketed matter should be deleted.

MR. GENTRY: I would like to point out that Mr. Sykes who is not here feels it should be deleted as well. He participated in the writing of this.

MR. SCANLAN: One of the abuses I had in mind when I opposed any referendum procedure was the congressional redistricting petition where the Baltimore congressmen petitioned an act of General Assembly to referendum. If this bracketed matter is deleted, they would have had an even easier task. They could have solicited all their signatures from the City of Baltimore. Would that be correct, Mr. Gentry? Using the not so hypothetical example to which I refer, if the bracketed matter is deleted, those signatures, they wouldn't have had to go to Baltimore County, is that correct?
