sections as we go through it. If anyone has questions to ask, he can do that. Then we will come back and begin consideration of the report section by section.

MR, MILLER: And that a motion to embody the historic language that is appropriate would be to go to the Committee on Style or whatever.

THE CHAIRMAN: No, we can come back to that later but I want to have the whole report before the Commission before we start debating about particular sections.

MR. MARTINEAU: I had understood when this

Committee, I believe, submitted its first report that we agreed that the Declaration of Rights was to include more specific language such as this but that we wanted to preserve much of the language, I believe, that Mr. Case and others are concerned about in a preamble.

I thought you were directed to write one. I see no mention of it.

MR. GENTRY: We haven't got it yet. We will have a preamble.
