articles in the U.S. Constitution as well that as far as preserving language, we have made an attempt to preserve the U.S. Bill of Rights language wherever possible.

Section 3, "No law shall be enacted respecting the establishment of religion. No person shall be restricted in the free exercise of religious profession and workship, nor shall any person be disqualified from holding public office or rendered incompetent as a witness or juror because of his opinion on matters of religious belief."

This picks up sections of the present
Maryland Declaration of Rights, Articles 36, 37, and 39,
some of which has been struck down by the Supreme
Court. It also picks up, as you might notice again, the
language of the U.S. Bill of Rights.

Section 4, "No person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor shall any person be denied the equal protection of the laws. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation."

This incorporates, as pointed out in the
