Mr. Goldsborough, of Talbot, submitted the following message:

BY THE SENATE,

June 18th, 1861.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates :

As there exists a difference between the Senate and House respecting the pay and mileage of the members, we respectfully suggest to your body the appointment of a Committee of Conference on this subject, so as to procure a unanimity of action, as this body is informed there has been a disagreement between the Joint Committee heretofore appointed and the action of the respective Houses of this General Assembly, and the said Committee be instructed to report as early as possible.
