An act to relieve the Mayor and Board of Police of the City of Baltimore, and all persons who acted under the orders of the Mayor or of the Board of Police of Baltimore City in their efforts to maintain peace and good order, and prevent further strife on and after the occurrences of the 19th April, 1861, in said city, from prosecution for or in consequence of their acts or obedience to said orders.

Which was read a second time.

Mr. Yellott moved a suspension of the rules, in order to give the bill a second reading.
