Which was read and referred to the Committee on Federal Relations.

On motion of Mr. Miller, The House at 2 o'clock adjourned.

SATURDAY, May 11, 1861.

The House met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Zacharias.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Fiery proposed the following:

Resolved, By the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Delegates lately elected from Baltimore city, and now members of this body, were elected in plain violation of the 29th Section of the Constitution and the 49th Section of the Code of Public Laws, and are therefore not legally entitled to seats upon this floor;

Which was read the first time.
