been furnished you was written at Baltimore, and if I took a copy, I have mislaid it.

On receiving your first order in reference to the matter, I wrote to the Secretary of War asking for a copy of the letter, but have not as yet, received a response.

The substance of the letter was an inquiry of the Secretary of War, "whether the four regiments, for which a requisition upon me had been made by the President, would be required to serve outside the State of Maryland, if mustered into service in accordance with said requisition?"
