Mr. Brune presented the following:

To the Honorable, the Senators

and Representatives of the Legislature of Maryland:

Gentlemen:—The undersigned memorialists, Merchandize Brokers of Baltimore, respectfully represent, that they have heretofore paid a License to the State of Maryland, each year of three hundred dollars. (\$300.) They further represent that trade is prostrated and commerce paralized, by the civil war, blockade and danger to all property which now pervades our once happy country. Therefore, they pray your Honorable Bodies, to suspend the collection of said licenses for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-one, (1861) or by statute or simple resolution, repeal the payment of sixty-six per cent. (66) thereof, until the year 1863, when peace and commerce shall have been restored again to our distracted land.

And as in duty bound, they will ever pray, &c.
