
William Parks, Public Printer of Maryland and Virginia

PARKS'S Maryland Gazette, THE FIRST NEWSPAPER SOUTH OF PENNSYLVANIA

Principally, however, was the Province indebted to Parks for his establishment of its first newspaper. In the month of September 1727, appeared the inaugural issue of the Maryland Gazette, the first newspaper to be published south of Pennsylvania, and the seventh to attain regular publication in English America. It was issued continuously until March 1730/31, when it seems to have been discontinued to resume publication again nearly two years later, in December 1732. At this time its proprietor formed a part-
