UNDER IT CONCERNING THE HARVEST OR CREEL LIMITS FOR STRIPED BASS, COMMONLY KNOWN AS ROCKFISH, THE COURT MAY REVOKE A LICENSE FOR NOT LESS THAN 1 YEAR NOR MORE THAN 5 YEARS.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 1990.

(Senate Bill 754)

AN ACT concerning

Ambient Air Quality Control Permit and Permit for a Solid Waste Acceptance
Facility - Environmental Impact Statement - Baltimore City
