CHAP. CCLV.

An Act to ascertain the number of Deaf and Dumb of this State.

Passed Mar 13 1827

1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That it shall be the duty of the collectors of the tax of the several counties respectively, to ascertain and report to the next general assembly the number of deaf and dumb residents of their respective counties. Collectors to report number of deaf and dumb in the respective counties

2. *And be it enacted*, That for the services which each collector of the tax may render in this behalf, he shall receive the sum of one dollar for every individual so ascertained as aforesaid to be deaf and dumb. Allowance therefor

CHAP. CCLVI.

A Further Supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a Company to make a Turnpike Road from the contemplated Bridge over the River Susquehanna, at Conowingo creek, to the Pennsylvania line. Passed Mar 12 1827

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That it shall be lawful for the commissioners named in the original act, passed at December session eighteen hundred and sixteen, chapter two hundred and thirty-five, or those named in a supplement thereto, passed at December session eighteen hundred and twenty-five, chapter ninety-six, or any one or more of them, at any time or place that they may see proper, to open books for taking subscriptions for stock in the said turnpike road company; and any subscriptions so taken or made shall be as binding, as if taken or made at the time or times limited by the original act, or the former supplement thereto, any thing therein to the contrary notwithstanding. Books may be opened for subscriptions

CHAP. CCLVII.

An Act for the relief of George Lewis Opperman of the City of Baltimore. Passed Mar 13 1827

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That from and after the passage of this act, the marriage contract between George Lewis Opperman and Ann Opperman, is hereby declared to be annulled and destroyed, and the said George Lewis Opperman is hereby declared to be divorced from his wife Ann Opperman, as entirely, and to as full extent, as if the said Ann Opperman were dead, or as if he the said George Lewis Opperman had never been joined in matrimony with her. Marriage annulled

CHAP. CCLVIII.

An Act to divorce Mary Ann Darrington, and her Husband William D. Darrington, of the City of Baltimore. Passed Mar 13 1827

1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That the said Mary Ann Darrington be and she is hereby di- Divorce granted
