## A Bibliography of Maryland Imprints

The text of this pamphlet which was also printed in the Maryland Journal and Baltimore Advertiser is followed by a postscript dated April 25, 1778, which mentions the arrival of the proceedings of Congress on conciliation, too late to be printed in this publication. However, the printer inserted a short paragraph at the end of the last page stating the opinion of Congress that negotiations cannot be carried on until England recognizes the Independence of the colonies and withdraws her fleet and armies. (The cut of the ship is the same that was frequently used in the Maryland Journal and Baltimore Advertiser for shipping notices.)
