

occurs in the Telegraphe of December 3, 1798, where the anonymous novel, Ambrose and Eleanor⁵⁵ was offered for sale at six shillings sixpence, and the manufacture and sale of printer's ink was announced. Ambrose and Eleanor seems to have been a fortunate choice of a first publication, for it proved so popular that it was reprinted in 1799.⁵⁶

William Warner, the new partner, must have given a strong impetus to the commercial side of the business, which, as Hanna and Greene, had given Baltimore two of her typographically most attractive imprints. For in 1799 the new firm issued a variety of publications, among which were Samuel Knox's An Essay on the Best System of Liberal Education,⁵⁷ a prize essay accepted by the American Philosophical Association; the Case of Jonathan Robbins, Examined by Charles Pinckney;⁵⁸ and three publications for the prominent lawyer, Thomas Herty, the Constitution of the United States of America ... and, General Washington's Paternal Address ... on his Resigning the Presidency,⁵⁹ the Militia Law of the State of Maryland,⁶⁰ and Herty's own compilation, A Digest of the Laws of Maryland,⁶¹
