Thirty dollars / reward. / Ran away, on the 22d of August last, a handsome Negro lad, / named / Arch, / about twenty years of age - the property of the sub- / scribe - of a yellow complexion, talks sensible and artful, but if close / examined is apt to tremble; he is rather under the size of a man, active - / made, with small legs, and has a ridge, or scar on the back of his neck. He had / on and took with him, a new Russia-sheeting shirt, an old Irish linnen, and an old / country linnen ditto, a pair of old black everlasting breeches, a pair of oznabrig / trousers, and an old hat, though he probably will part from his cloaths, and pro- / cure others if an opportunity offers. / I live in Maryland, near Frederick-Town, and will pay the above reward, / if the said fellow be taken sixty miles, or any further distance from home; or a / half dollar per mile, for any distance under, in case he be secured in any goal; / so that I get him again; and if brought home reasonable charge, by / [signed] Ignatius Davis. / Frederick-county, September 7, 1791. / [double rule]
