The office and materials were to remain in Hayes' possession for six months,

unless he can procure to himself materials for a printing office from Glasgow or some other place which the said Hayes may find more convenient.

At the expiration of that time, Hayes agreed to deliver all materials of the printing house to Killen; Hayes at the same time was answerable for all debts contracted
