

abatement of the epidemic, the removal to the former location at 36 Market Street was effected.⁷² The Telegraphe kept a strict, perhaps difficult, neutrality in the hotly contested election of 1800, up to November 1 when it made a definite statement that it was aligned on the side of Jefferson⁷³ - a decision which was certainly not strange in view of the Irish nationality of the editor.⁷⁴

The date when the Telegraphe suspended publication is not certain; the last issue located is that of February 6, 1807; it could not have lasted much longer, for Dobbin died on February 10, 1808.⁷⁵

His inventory, signed by John Haves and William Pechin, lists the printing equipment necessary for a daily city newspaper - probably little different from the equipment which Dobbin used during the 1790's:
