Dr. Robertson cautiously refrained from sending materials outside the Hall, but the Archivist feels that materials which have been taken apart for repair should be rebound. Last year some material was bound and this year a great deal more was sent away with good results. The following materials were entrusted to commercial binders and are now back in use:
