BINDING

The members of the Commission will recall that prior to 1939-1940 only a very few volumes in the Hall of Records collection had been bound; it had been thought unwise to risk the materials out of the building. Last year binding equipment was bought for the Hall and some fine binding was done in the repair department by Mrs. Krebs. At the same time all other binding work was sent under proper safeguards to Baltimore. This program was continued for another year and has proved to be satisfactory.
