find an increasing audience. This year, happily, the annual increase which we noted for some years was resumed. The comparative figures given here below will show how much:

Of this number, 849 were microfilm reels, or approximately ten per cent of the total. The increase in the use of film was slightly greater than the overall increase, and this was expected because our holdings of microfilm are increasing at a faster rate than are our accessions of original materials, and from now on will continue to do so. This is especially true in the area of county records beginning with the mandatory transfer date of 1788 to the present. Many of the county records given in the following list are microfilm:
