

CHAPTER 740.

AN ACT to add a new Section to Article 41 of the Code of Public General Laws of 1904, title "Governor," to be known as Section 28.

New section
added.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That Article 41 of the Code of Public General Laws of 1904, title "Governor," be and the same is hereby amended by adding an additional section thereto, to be known as Section 28, and to read as follows :

28. The Governor is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint, from time to time, one or more discreet persons to attend meetings of the boards of directors, managers, trustees or visitors of corporations and institutions receiving financial assistance from the treasury of the State; the said representative of the executive department is to have no vote in said bodies, but is to be entitled to be present at the meetings of the said boards of directors, managers, trustees or visitors and to give his views upon questions or matters under discussion or before said boards for consideration.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 741.

AN ACT to prohibit the owners of land along the Hagerstown and Smithsburg turnpike, in Washington County, from encroaching upon the lands of said Turnpike Company, by erecting fences along said turnpike outside of the established fence lines.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That it shall be unlawful for the owners of land bordering on the Hagerstown and Smithsburg turnpike, in Washington county, their agents, servants or employes, or for any other person, to erect, locate, build or establish and maintain any fences along said turnpike outside of the lines on which fences along the said turnpike now stand, but nothing in this Act shall be construed to prohibit the erection or repair of fences on the lines on which they now stand.
