Baltimore and counties of the State of Maryland, and that the principal office of said corporation so formed shall be Location of located in the city of Baltimore.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the aggregate of the capital stock of the said corporation so formed shall be Aggregate \$780,000, and that the said capital stock shall be divided capital stock. into six thousand shares of the par value of \$130 per share, subject to the right of the General Assembly to alter or amend this Act, and subject to all of the laws of this State relating to corporations applicable thereto.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 763.

AN ACT to authorize the Johnston Hospital for girls, and school and home for nurses of Baltimore city, to increase the number of its managers to more than twelve and not more than twenty, and to fix from time to time by its by-laws the number of corporators or managers necessary to constitute a quorum at meetings thereof, and to provide for maintaining succession.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Johnston Hospital for girls, and school and home for nurses of Baltimore city, incorporated under the general incorporation laws of Maryland in the year 1884 for Board of manage the purely charitable objects of providing hospital accommodation for girls and a training-school and home for nurses, and whose charter was made perpetual by an Act of the General Assembly of said year, being Chapter 98, be and it is hereby authorized to increase the number of its board of managers to not exceeding twenty.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the said corporation may, by its by-laws, from time to time fix the number of its corporators and the number of its managers necessary to constitute a quorum at meetings thereof respectively, and Quorum. said numbers may be fixed at less than a majority of either body, and for the purpose of maintaining succession the members of either body may be treated as members of the other body, as heretofore provided by law.
