other person from recovering from the petitioner for any work thereafter done for, or goods, wares or merchandise. thereafter furnished to the petitioner's wife or on her order.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That any tradesman or other person who shall, after the receipt of said notice, institute against the petitioner any action, or make any effort to Liable for collect from him any bill or charge for such goods, wares or merchandise, or work, shall be liable to an action by the petitioner for damages for the annoyance and mortification thereby inflicted.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That in any application provided for in the first section of this Act the wife shall be entitled to have counsel for the protection of her interests Entitle to have counsel. and rights, whose service shall be paid for by the petitioner to an amount to be fixed by the said court; and the wife shall have the right at any time to apply to the said court for a rescission of the said order in case the petitioner shall discontinue supplying her with reasonable necessaries or funds reasonably sufficient to purchase the same as aforesaid, and the petition, answer and all other papers filed, and all hearings and proceeding under this section and under the first section of this Act shall be private so far as may be lawful.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That all Acts or parts of Acts in conflict with this Act be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent (and no further) that the same are so Repeal in conflict.

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

## CHAPTER 769.

AN ACT to repeal and re-enact with amendments Section 288 of Article 23 of the Code of Public General Laws of the State of Maryland of the year 1888, providing for the appointment of policemen for the protection of property, and amending the same to provide that such policemen have to be citizens of the State of Maryland.
