

AN ACT to repeal and re-enact with amendments Sections 143 and 144 of Article 2 of the Code of Public Local Laws, title "Anne Arundel County," sub-title "Fish, Crabs and Terrapins," as enacted by Chapter 579 of the Acts of 1902, and to add a new section to said article under said sub-title, to be designated as Section 144 A.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That Sections 143 and 144 of Article 2 of the Code of Public Local Laws, title "Anne Arundel County," sub-title "Fish, Crabs and Terrapins," be and the same are hereby repealed and re-enacted with amendments, so as to read as follows :

Repeal and re-enact.

143. It shall not be lawful for any person or corporation to use in the rivers or waters of Anne Arundel county any seine or net in catching or taking fish, the meshes of which shall be less than one inch square.

Unlawful to use seine or net in catching fish.

144. If any person or corporation shall use or haul in the rivers or waters of said county any seine or net exceeding ten fathoms in length, the meshes of which shall be less than one inch square, shall be fined for each offense not less than one dollar nor more than twenty dollars.

Fine imposed.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted,* That a new section be and the same is hereby added to said article under said sub-title, to be numbered 144 A, and to come in after Section 144, and to read as follows :

New section added.

144 A. It shall not be lawful for any person or corporation to set, place, construct or use in the waters of South river, in said county, or in any creek, cove or inlet thereof, above Hills point on the north side and Round point on the south side, any pound net ; and any person or corporation violating the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction before any justice of the peace of said county, be fined not less than one dollar nor more than twenty dollars for each and every offense.

Unlawful to use a pound net.

SEC. 3. *And be it enacted,* That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.
