

\$10.00 or more than \$25.00, and costs for each bird or animal so shot, killed or caught, contrary to the proviso of this section, and in default of such fine and costs the offender shall be confined in the county jail 20 days or until such fine and costs are paid, unless sooner released by operation of law.

CHAP. 380

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to shoot, catch or kill any game on the Lord's day, commonly called Sunday, and any person violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine of not less than (\$25.00) or more than (\$50.00) and costs for each bird or animal so shot, killed or caught, and in default of said fine and cost to be confined in the county jail for 30 days or until said fine and costs are paid, unless sooner released by operation of law.

Game law.

5. Any justice of the peace of the State of Maryland, in and for the county where the offense shall be committed, shall have jurisdiction to hear and determine all prosecution for the purpose of enforcing fine and costs collectible under the provisions of this Act; and all such fines are hereby expressly made subject to the provisions of Section 8 of Chapter 293 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at the Session of 1896; and in all cases where such prosecutions are begun or instituted by any person other than the State game warden or one of his deputies, and shall result in the collection of a fine or fines, then one-half of such fine or fines to go to the informer, the other half to the State game warden for the protection and increase of game.

Magistrates to hear and determine violations.

SEC. 2. All Acts and parts of Acts of the Code of Public General and Public Local Laws now in force in the State of Maryland inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Act be and the same are hereby repealed so far as the same applies to said county.

Repeal.

SEC. 6. That nothing in this Act shall apply to any person who may have in his possession partridges, quails or pheasants imported into the State of Maryland for breeding purposes.

Exempt from law.
