A body corporate.

Corporate powers.

William Lee and Henry A. Parr, and their associates and successors, be and they are hereby constituted a body corporate by the name of the Green Spring Valley Game Protective Association, for the purpose of propagating, protecting and preserving all kinds of game, on the property of said body corporate and of its members, which it or they now own or may hereafter acquire or control; and by said name shall be capable of purchasing, holding, selling, leasing and conveying property, real, personal and mixed, so far as may be necessary to carry out the object of the said body corporate; to have perpetual succession; to sue and be sued; to plead and be impleaded, in any court of law or equity; to make, have and use a common seal, and the same to break, alter and renew at their pleasure; to make by-laws for the government of said body corporate and its officers; provided, the same shall not conflict with the Constitution or the laws of this State or of the United States; and generally to do and execute all and singular such acts, matters and things as a corporation may and can lawfully execute, and all such matters and things as may be necessary to carry out

Appointment to the Governor to commission such persons as the said corpo-of police-ration may designate to act as policemen. of the property and game of the said corporation and of the members thereof, and for the preservation of peace and good order on said premises.
