Bright one hundred and sixty-three dollars and twenty-two cents, for plumbing pipes and gas fixtures furnished the state house and grounds; to Edgar Hutton, for painting and material furnished the state house, three hundred and seventy-five dollars and thirty-six cents; to Clayton & Co., for sundries furnished for the use of the senate and house of delegates, two hundred and eighteen dollars and ninety-one cents; to W. G. Purnell, for services rendered as superintendent of repairs to state house, by order of Governor Lloyd, three hundred and one dollars and thirty-five cents; to James E. Ryan, for carpenter work and material furnished the state house, one hundred and ten dollars and fifty-five cents; to William F. Williams, for repairing and cleaning gas engine and ventilating apparatus, fifty dollars; to Sadtler & Sons, for thermometers furnished the state house, ten dollars and fifty cents; to J. Seth Hopkins & Co., for four large brass cuspidors, ten dollars; to Robert Miller, for services rendered as laborer to state house, twenty-seven dollars; to William Schultz, for repairing and cleaning clocks in state house, ten dollars; to John M. Boucher, for plastering dome and material furnished to state house, five dollars; to Carr Brothers, for galvanizing iron pipe for ventilating apparatus for register and labor furnished the state house, sixteen dollars and fifty cents; to C. Bossels, for repairing locks, eighteen dollars and ninety cents; all of which labor performed and material furnished was by order of Governor Henry Lloyd, under the superintendence of W. G. Purnell, secretary of the senate, the vouchers for each and every item of expenditure having been presented to the committee of the two houses of the general assembly having jurisdiction over appropriations.
