Fulks; thence with a straight line across the lands of the said Ignatius T. Fulks, Philemon M. Smith, the Fitzgerald road, and the lands of Martha A. Meem, to a stone planted on the land of Henry C. Ward; thence with a straight line across the land of said Henry C. Ward, the Metropolitan Branch railroad, the lands of said Martha A. Meem, David M. Munro, the Georgetown and Frederick road, to the dividing line between Ignatius T. Fulks and James O. Rabbit; thence with said dividing line to the beginning.

Elect commis-

SEC. 3. *And be it enacted*, That the citizens of said town, having resided therein six months previous to any election, shall on the first Monday in May next, or as soon thereafter as conveniently may be, and biennially thereafter on the same day, elect five commissioners of Gaithersburg to serve for one year, or until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The commissioners must be substantial citizens, residents in said corporate limits, and must have resided therein for at least six months next preceding their election, and must continue so to reside during their term of office. They shall receive no pay for their services, except the president, who shall receive the fees hereinafter allowed.

SEC. 6. The commissioners shall biennially, on or before the first Monday in April, appoint three judges of election who shall appoint one clerk; and the said judges shall conduct the election according to the election laws of this state, except that the polls shall be opened at one o'clock in the afternoon and closed at six o'clock in the afternoon; and the judges and
