station; thence continuing with the road leading to "Tull's Corner," running by and with said road until the bridge commonly called the "Branch Bridge" is reached; thence by and with said creek or stream, crossed by said bridge, known as East creek to its mouth in the Pocomoke sound.

Names to be stricken from list. SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the officers of registration of Brinkley's election district number 3, to strike from the lists of qualified voters on the registration books thereof, names of all persons residing within the limits thereof of that portion of said Brinkley's district hereby placed in Lawson's district, who shall hereafter be entitled to vote in Lawson's district.

Effective.

SEC. 3. And be it enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 470.

AN ACT to pay Edward W. Miller, of Frederick County, late weigher-general of grain, and D. P. Osborne, of Allegany County, late assistant weigher of grain, for services rendered the State in weighing grain in Baltimore City in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-six.

Preamble.

WHEREAS, Edward W. Miller, of Frederick county, late weigher-general of grain, and D. P. Osborne, of Allegany county, late assistant weigher of grain, were appointed by the Governor of Maryland as weigher-general and assistant weigher, respectively, during the January session of 1896; and

Preamble.

Whereas, After having performed their duties according to law, for the space of forty-two days, it was discovered, and they were so advised by the Attorney General, that owing to a defect in the law it was impossible to collect their fees from the owners of the grain; and their resignations having been tendered and accepted by the Governor; therefore,

Appropriation. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Comptroller of the Treasury is hereby authorized and empowered to issue his warrant upon the Treasurer of the State, out of any monies not otherwise appropriated, in favor of the said Edward W. Miller for the sum of two hundred and seventeen dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$217.97,) and of the said D. P. Osborne for the sum of one hundred and eighty-four dollars and forty-seven cents (\$184.74,) as per bills
