Double letters or those containing more than one piece of paper, are charged with double these rates. Triple letters, triple rates, &c.

Newspapers to any distance in the State in which they are printed or out of the State not over 100 miles, are charged with 1 cent postage. Over 100 miles and out of the State 1½ cents each.

Letters for Foreign Ports, must have the American inland Postage paid where they are mailed.

Office hours from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M. in the summer season, and from 7 A. M. to 6 P. M. in winter, and from 9 to 10 A. M. on Sunday.

DEPOTS FOR LETTERS.

Baltimore Post Office, June 1, 1842.

By the regulations prescribed by the Post Master General, for a system of "Letter-Carriers in the cities of the United States," the Carriers are permitted to receive letters for deposit in the Post Office, at all places within their respective Districts, as also to establish, with the approbation of the Department, particular places of deposit within their respective Districts, for such letters as are intended to be sent to the Post Office.

In pursuance of these regulations, and with a view of extending the accommodations of the Post Office, by facilitating the transmission of letters to the Office, as well as from it, the following depots for the receipt of letters, to be placed in the Post Office, have been established in the several Districts of the Carriers, as named:

In J. Musselman's District—The Three Tun Tavern, corner of Pratt and Paca sts. west of Chatsworth.

In J. Gallaher's District—Golden Horse Tavern, corner Howard and Franklin sts.

In W. White's District—At Wm. Moore's, corner Pratt street and Smith's wharf.

In E. A. Wells's District—At Messrs. Ahern & Boyd's, corner of Baltimore and Liberty streets.

In E. C. Johnson's District—Corner of Thames and Market streets, F. P.

In H. Lusby's District—Number 14 Exeter street, north of Pitt.
