Colored public schools in Baltimore in 1870 were as follows:

- Male No. 1—No. 5 Lexington St., John R. Roche, Principal.
 - Male No. 2—Douglas and East Sts., D. J. Cummings, Principal.
 - Male No. 3—No. 77 Camden St., John L. Yates, Principal.
 - Male No. 4—Biddle St. near Pennsylvania Ave., S. B. Wolfe, Principal.
 - Male No. 5—Eastern Ave., near Broadway, W. V. Walton, Principal.
 - Male No. 6—Montgomery near Hanover St., J. M. Armstrong, Principal.
 - Male No. 7—Stockton near Baltimore St., George Scott, Principal.
- Female Schools Nos. 1, 3, 5 and 6, occupied same building with Male School of same number. Female No. 2 was corner Thompson and Young Sts., and Female No. 4 on Orchard St. near Druid Hill Ave.

Only one of these buildings was owned by the city, that occupied by No. 5; all the others were rented.
