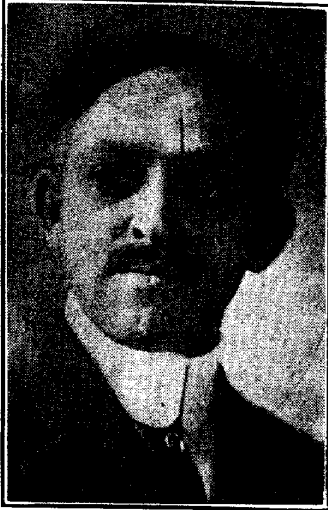


DWIGHT O. W. HOLMES.
