Public General Laws of Maryland of 1904, as amended by Chapter 219 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1910, be and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted to read as follows:

SEC. 50. Every trust company incorporated under any law or laws of this State, shall possess the powers and be subject to the provisions of this Act, and wherever the words "Articles of Association" occur in the provisions of this Act, they shall be construed to include legislative charters and Articles of incorporated; provided, however, nothing in this Act shall be construed to repeal, modify or affect any special right, privileges or powers conferred upon any trust company heretofore created under any law of this State, by their respective charters, if said companies were organized and doing business prior to April 8th, 1910.

SEC. VI. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

Approved April 16th, 1914.

CHAPTER 806.

An Act to declare the sanction and consent of the General Assembly of Maryland to sundry gifts, bequests and devises contained in the last wills and testaments of certain persons, deceased, and also to certain gifts, grants, sales, leases and deeds made by various persons to and for the use and benefit of sundry ministerial persons, religious corporations, educational institutions, denominations or sects, and to certain charitable institutions hereinafter named.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the sanction and consent of said General Assembly of Maryland be and the same is hereby declared, given and granted to the following gifts, bequests, devises, grants, sales, leases, conveyances and deeds, to and from certain persons and bodies corporate to and for the use of certain minister al persons, religious and educational corporations, orders, denominations and sects, and to certain charitable institutions, as herein set forth:

(1) To the devise and bequest of John B. Oldershaw, late of Baltimore City, deceased, of the residue of his estate to the "The Home for the Aged of the Methodist Episcopal Church
