SEC. 3. *Be it further enacted*, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 162.

AN ACT to appropriate a certain sum of money to the support of the Home for Widows and Orphans of Physicians, Inc., a charitable institution located in the City of Baltimore, for each of the two fiscal years ending on the thirtieth day of September, 1915, and on the thirtieth day of September, 1916, respectively.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That the sum of Three Thousand Dollars for the fiscal year 1915, and the like sum of Three Thousand Dollars for the fiscal year 1916, be and they are hereby appropriated (out of any money in the Treasury of the State of Maryland not otherwise appropriated) to the support of the Home for Widows and Orphans of Physicians, Inc., a charitable institution located in the City of Baltimore, to be issued in accordance with the provisions of Section 328 of Article 27 of the Code of Public General Laws.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted*, That the Treasurer of the State shall upon the warrant of the Comptroller of the Treasury pay the said sums of money herein appropriated for the objects and purposes hereinbefore specified to or upon the order of the person or persons or body corporate entitled to receive the same; and all of the aforesaid appropriations, to the Home for Widows and Orphans of Physicians, Inc., shall be paid in equal quarterly installments.

CHAPTER 163.

AN ACT to repeal and re-enact with amendments Section 160-A of Article 33 of the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, title "Elections," sub-title "Primary Elections," as said Section was enacted by Chapter 134 of the Acts of 1912.
