SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 202.

An Acr to add an additional Section to Article 95 of the Code of Public General Laws of the State of Maryland, title "Treasurer," said Section to follow immediately after Section 31 of said Article, and to be designated as Section 32; such new Section to provide for the deposit of moneys of the State in Trust Companies as well as in Banks.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That a new Section be, and the same is hereby, added to Article 95 of the Code of Public General Laws of the State of Maryland, title "Treasurer," said Section to follow immediately after Section 31 of said Article, and to be designated as Section 32, and to read as follows:

Sec. 32. The Treasurer may deposit the moneys of the State in such bank or banks as he may so select, or in such Trust Company or Trust Companies, incorporated under the laws of this State and doing business therein, as he may, from time to time, with the approval of the Governor, select; such depositories giving security, satisfactory to the Governor, for the safe-keeping and forthcoming, when required, of said deposits.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

CHAPTER 203.

An Acr to make an appropriation for the payment of the expenses of the Commissioners for the Promotion of Uniformity of Legislation in the United States for the years ending September 30, 1915, and September 30, 1916.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, payable out of any monies in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated is hereby appropriated, subject to the audit of the Comptroller, for the payment of the expenses of the Commissioners from the State of Maryland for the Promotion of Uniformity of Legislation in the United States for the year ending September 30, 1915.
