

twenty days' notice, and shall be conducted in all respects as regular elections are conducted.

Section 300. The Mayor by virtue of his office shall preside over all meetings of the City Council and see that the ordinances of the City are duly and faithfully executed; by and with the advice and consent of the City Council he shall annually appoint a Bailiff, Clerk and Treasurer, and such other officers as the ordinances of the City may provide; he shall annually on the first Monday in April report to the Council in writing the general state of the City, with an accurate account of money received and expended, which said report shall be published in two newspapers of said City, if so many be published therein giving a full particular statement of all receipts and disbursements; he shall have power to remove any of the officers appointed by him for neglect or violation of any duties pertaining to their respective offices, and shall appoint others in their stead, subject to confirmation by the City Council as in the case of original appointments; he shall have general supervision of the City, and he shall receive for his services an annual salary of Fifty Dollars; he shall, by and with the advice and consent of the City Council, appoint three citizens of known integrity, experience and sound judgment, one of whom shall be a physician, who, together with the Mayor and City Attorney, shall constitute the Board of Health, and as such shall have all authority within the limits of said City, and within one mile thereof, that is now or may be hereafter vested in the Health Officer of Harford County or in inspectors of the State Board of Health, or that may be vested in them by the Charter and ordinances of said City. The members of said Board shall hold office for two years from the date of their respective appointments and until the qualification of their successors, and shall receive such compensation for their services as may be allowed by ordinance.

Section 301. All ordinances passed by the City Council shall be attested by the Clerk and approved by the Mayor; if the Mayor shall disapprove any ordinance passed by the Council, he shall return the same, with his reasons therefor, at their next regular meeting, when, if passed by five-sixths of all members elected to said Council, over the Mayor's veto, it shall be an ordinance to all intents and purposes as if it had been approved by the Mayor; and if the Mayor shall fail to return any ordinance passed by said Council, at their next regular meeting after it shall have been presented to him, such ordinance shall
