CHAPTER 174.

Passed Mar. 11, 1837, *An act to ascertain the allowance of the Sheriff of Somerset county for keeping prisoners in gaol, and to provide for the maintenance of debtors actually confined in prison.*

25 cents per day

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That from and after the passage of this act it shall and may be lawful for the sheriff of Somerset county to ask, demand and receive, for keeping each prisoner in gaol and finding him or her in victuals, twenty-five cents per day, and no more, to be levied and collected as heretofore, any law or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

1 dollar 75 cts per week for debtors

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted,* That in lieu of the sum of eighty-seven and a half cents per week, which the said sheriff is now entitled to receive for the support and maintenance of every debtor arrested on a *capias ad satisfaciendum*, it shall and may be lawful for said sheriff to demand and receive the sum of one dollar and seventy-five cents per week, to be paid according to the provisions of an act, entitled, an act to provide for the support and maintenance of debtors actually confined in prison, passed at December session, eighteen hundred and twenty.

Passed Mar. 10, 1837, *An act for the relief of Samuel S. Hays, of Montgomery county, administrator of William Trail, deceased*

Preamble

WHEREAS, Samuel S. Hays, of Montgomery county, administrator of William Trail, late of said county, deceased, by his petition to the General Assembly of Maryland has set forth that by the act of Assembly of eighteen hundred and thirty-one, chapter thirty-nine, commissioners were appointed to lay out and open a
