1837. Resolution authorising Captain Henry McKinnell to take possession of six pieces of artillery, &c.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Captain Henry McKinnell be, and he is hereby authorised and empowered to take possession of six pieces of artillery belonging to the State of Maryland, and cause the same to be repaired as required by resolution number twenty-eight, passed December session, eighteen hundred and thirty-four; provided, that the said Captain McKinnell shall give bond and security, to be approved by the Executive, for the safe keeping of said pieces of artillery.

1837. Resolution relating to a Fire Proof Magazine.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Governor and Council be, and they are hereby authorised to contract for the erection, as soon as practicable, of a fire proof magazine, to be located in such place as they may select, for the safe keeping and preservation of the powder and fixed ammunition belonging to the State; provided, that the cost of erecting said magazine shall not exceed one thousand dollars.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That all fines and forfeitures which may be imposed upon any members of the volunteer troop of cavalry in Washington county, commanded by captain Abraham
