DELEGATE TO THE GENERAL

ASSEMBLY,—No, shall during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the constitution or laws of this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments thereof increased during such time.

No, shall be eligible, during the time he shall continue to act as such, to any civil office whatever.

At the election for delegates to the General Assembly for 1838 and annually until after the next census shall be officially promulged, the number of delegates to be elected from the cities of Baltimore and Annapolis and each of the several counties prescribed.

From the census of 1840, and every second census thereafter, the representation in the house of delegates shall be graduated on the following basis:

Every county having less than 15000 souls, federal numbers, shall have three diglegates; having 15000, and less than 25000, four delegates; having 25000 and less than 35000, five delegates; having over 57000 souls, six delegates,

The city of Baltimore shall be entitled to elect as many delegates, as the county which shall have the largest representation on the basis aforesaid.
