Bridges, is not sufficient to vent the water which often flows CHAP. 262. down, and also that the said Bridge is in bad order, Therefore:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly, of Mary-bery authored limit, That the levy courts of Queen Anne's and Caroline counties, be and they are hereby authorised and required to levy, each, an equal sum, not to exceed in the whole amount contains exclusive of the per diem of the commissioners, the sum of one hundred dollars, (on condition that the said levy courts, or a majority of each of them agree that they believe the public interest requires the same, and not otherwise) for the owner purpose of erecting one new bridge, or to lengthen and respair the present one, at the discretion of the commissioners hereinafter named.

Sec. 2. And be it caucted, That Colonel James Roe, Communications James Merrick, and Thomas Bewley, of Queen Anne's country, and Parratt Roe, William S. Dooker, and William Clough, of Caroline country, be, and they are hereby appointed commissioners to contract for and superintend the building or repairing of said bridge.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That the levy to be made by prepared the provisions of this act, shall stand to the credit of said commissioners, for the purpose herein mentioned, on the levy list of the respective counties, who shall, and they are hereby authorised to draw on the respective collectors of the county tax, for the amount so levied.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That the said commission component ers or superincendants, appointed in virtue of the second section of this act, shall each be entitled to the sum or two dollars, for every day's attendance as such, for which an account shall be rendered to the respective levy courts, with an affidavit thereon, to be by them levied and collected as other county charges are.

CHAPTER 262.

An act to ratify, confirm, and make valid, artific acts and Passa Marco to deeds, done and executed by William H. Fitzkugh, as Sheriff of Washington County.

WHEREAS, there is a coubt entertained, whether William Processing H. Fitzhugh, at the time of his having become Sherif of
