Repeal

Sec. 8. *And be it enacted*, That so much of the act to which this is a supplement as is hereby amended or supplied, be, and the same is hereby repealed, made null and void.

CHAPTER 282.

Passed Mar. 21, 1835. *An act to authorise the recording of a certain Deed of Sale and Manumission.*

Preamble

WHEREAS, William Hartshorn, and Samuel G. Griffith, trustee of said Hartshorn, by deed dated the fifth day of November, in the year eighteen hundred and nineteen, sold to William Wilson, junior, for a term of seven years, from the first day of January, in the year eighteen hundred and twenty, a mulatto female slave named Chancy, which deed declared and stipulated, that said slave should be free at the end of said term; *and whereas*, said deed has been, through inadvertence omitted to be recorded within the time prescribed by law, for recording deeds of manumission;—
Therefore,

Deed recorded

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the said deed be, and the same is hereby authorised to be recorded, and that said deed, when so recorded, if recorded before the first day of October next, shall have the same validity and effect, to all intents and purposes, as if the same had been recorded within the time prescribed as aforesaid, as to the said Chancy, and as to her children Ellen Barker and Edward Barker.

Divorce

Section 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That Ann B. Wilcox, of Baltimore city, be, and she is hereby divorced from her husband, James Wilcox, of Kent county; and the marriage contract, heretofore had and solemnized between them, to be henceforth null and
