Passed Mar. 3, 1834. Resolution in favor of R. W. Gill and Alexander Cheves, Esquires.

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Treasurer of the Western Shore be, and he is hereby authorised to pay, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, to R. W. Gill and Alexander Cheves, Esquires, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars each, for services rendered the State in prosecuting the examination and trials of the rioters on the Baltimore and Washington Rail Road.

Resolution in favor of William Welch.

*Resolved,* That the Treasurer of the Western Shore, pay to William Welch, a delegate returned from Kent county, six days itinerant charges, in addition to those allowed on the Journal of Accounts, inasmuch as the said William Welch, in consequence of indisposition, was prevented attending at the seat of government on the day fixed for the meeting of the Legislature, and has since, by the severe frost and inclemency of the weather, been compelled to come around the head of the Bay, in order to attain the seat of government.

Resolution in favor of David Ridgely.

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Treasurer of the Western Shore, pay to David Ridgely, twenty dollars, for removing the Library, out of any unappropriated money in the Treasury.
