The Deposition of William Wheatley Senr. aged forty four years or thereabouts being sworn according to the above directions deposes as follows that about eight or nine years ago Capt. Stephen Hussy let Southy Whittington to run out some of the courses of low Quarter and begun at a white Oak standing on the South East End of a Planton Hammock in the paper on of the Capt. Hussy and their Reason for beginning at the South East End was to find out where the first boundse was and at the End of 22 poles there marked a scrubby Oak as a Memoriall of the first boundse which is now cut down and further saith not

The Deposition of Thomas Bayly aged eighty two years or thereabouts being sworn according to the above directions deposes as follows that some time since the showing of the boundse described in his other Deposition Capt. Stephen Hussy showed the oak that is described in William Wheatley's Deposition to this deponent and told him it was the second boundse of low Quarter and further saith not

The Deposition of Revill Hussy aged thirty one years or thereabouts being sworn according to the above directions deposes as follows that about twenty four years agoe his Father Stephen Hussy his brother John Hussy showed this deponent the Tree that stand on the South East End of the Hammock & told him it was the second boundse of low Quarter and this deponent further saith that he knew the said Tree when it was a green growing Tree which appeared to be marked and further saith not

(The below Depositions are taken in the behalf of the defendant John Davis and at his request) The Deposition of Jamson Wheatley aged fifty one years or thereabouts being sworn on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God deposes as follows that as near as he can remember about fifteen or sixteen years agoe he was present when Capt. Stephen Hussy had a company of People & Commissioners taking depositions to some boundse of his land and this deponent saith Capt. Hussy showed them a large dead white Oak standing near the East End of his the said Hussy's planting Hammock & told them that the said Oak was a boundse of a Tract of Land called low Quarter but this deponent does not remember what boundse of low Quarter but further saith that he heard him make mention of any other boundse of the aforesaid Tract of Land called low Quarter at that Time and further saith not

The Deposition of Rick Gunby aged fifty nine years or thereabouts being sworn according to the above directions deposes as follows that about fifteen or sixteen years agoe Capt. Stephen Hussy showed this deponent and sundry others a large dead white Oak standing on the South East End of a Planton Hammock and told him this deponent that Tree was the first Boundse of low Quarter or low Quarter begun at that Tree and further saith not

The Deposition of Benjamin Lankford aged fifty three years or thereabouts being sworn according to the above directions deposes as follows that about fifteen or sixteen years agoe that Stephen Hussy which is now deceased had a commission to prove the bounds of some Tracts of Land and he came with the Company to a large white Oak which stood on the South End of a Planton Hammock in possession of the said Hussy and this deponent further saith that the Capt. Hussy layeth his hand on the said Tree and said that Tree was the first boundse of low Quarter or that low Quarter begun at that Tree and this deponent further saith that some Months after wards John Hussy asked this deponent to walk over to the said Hammock to describe a boundse of low Quarter and this deponent told him that Boundse would last longer than any post he could set up and the said John Hussy told this deponent that they found their first boundse ought to stand on the North End of the Hammock by their Grant that his Father and he had

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
