The said Isaac Bewley in twenty pounds and the said William Dykes in ten pounds Lawfull Money of Great Britain to be made and lodged of their goods and Chattels Lands and Tenements for the use of the said Lord Propy his heirs and Successors Conditionally that if the said Isaac Bewley shall not make his personall appearance before this Court as a prosecutor for his Lordship against the said Isabella Cook and now at this Day here to wit the twenty first Day of March in the Year aforesaid mentioned the said ~~Isabella~~ having appeared the said Isaac Bewley and William Dykes their Recognizances are discharged

The Jurors for the Right Honourable the Lord Propy that now is for the body of Kent County aforesaid upon their Oath do present that Isabella Cook late of Saint Pauls parish in the County aforesaid the wife of Samuel Cook of the same County Tailor the first Day of January Anno Domini 1726 hundred twenty and six with force and Arms at the Parish aforesaid in the County aforesaid within the Jurisdiction of this Court and Simon Apron of the value of sixteen pounds of Tobacco of the goods and Chattels of a certain Isaac Bewley then and there being found then and there feloniously did steal take and bear away contrary to the peace of the said Lord Propy - that now is his gods rule and Government and against the form of the Act of Assembly in such Case lately made and provided

At the said Isabella Cook comes into Court in her proper person and saith that she is in no sort guilty of the premises above upon her Imposed on by the aforesaid Indictment it is alledged and thereof she putteth herself upon the Country
